THE PERFECT SUMMER PADDLE THE DEPOT LAKES

Every paddler knows those days: the perfect ones. The one where you open the curtains, the sun is streaming in, the air is warm and – if you're lucky and have planned ahead – the boat is already loaded onto the roof of the car. Such was that Saturday in July when the club members took on the Third Depot Lake to First Depot Lake paddle.

It's not a long paddle by club standards: just eight kilometres. But it certainly is one of those routes that more than makes up for paddling challenge with portages, fast water

and lots of opportunity for lining or pulling your craft over beaver jams and shallow rocky spots.

The route starts with a scramble down a sharp, gravely incline to the point of launch. On this trip, my canoe was also floating home to two dogs, Rigby and Sally. EMAIL RESEARCH OF PADDLING SALMON RIVER WHITEWATER—SPRING 2006

Dave! Tonight I enjoyed a long conversation with your brother Ed. He reckons it must have been 1966 when you and he first paddled the Lower Salmon, because it was just after he got his driver's license. He said you had a big heavy fibreglass canoe (which later took a beating on the Moira, Mississippi, Upper Salmon, etc). And he said nobody showed you the Lower Salmon. He remembers putting in below Forest Mills with no idea what perils might be waiting farther downstream! So it looks as if a couple of adventurous teenage Fergusons started all the fun that snowballed to Jack Brown in 1968, Jim Walmsley, Jim Moodie, me in 1971, and dozens of Queen's geology students after that.

Hey Jim, I would like to write a short piece about paddling on the Salmon River for a Friends-of-Salmon-River booklet to be published in the fall. As it was you and Ken Walmsley who introduced me to the beautiful 11km stretch from Roblin to Kingsford (was it 1971?), I am hoping maybe you know when and by whom it was first paddled for fun?

Hoy! Dugald. Boy, quite a bit of water has flowed under the bridge since we paddled the Salmon River. (I can see you scratching your head. What? We paddled under a bridge?) Maybe there was a bridge, for all I know. I guess it was around the time you mention. Jim

(not Ken) Walmsley would have a much better idea. He still lives in Kingston. Better phone soon, I think he is going to Chile to visit his son later on this week. Jim probably knows more about the white water history of the Salmon River. (Or he might put you onto some names of people who do.) He was the one who taught me my first lessons about whitewater canoeing on the Petawawa River long ago. Good luck with your article.

Hoy Jim! Thanks to your message, I just had a nice chat with Jim Walmsley! He remembers that paddle very well. Later, he was one of my daughter Wendy's teachers at KCVI (I had forgotten that). In fact we paddled under four bridges! Attached are three pix from a canoe-club trip last April. Jim gave me a number for Jack Brown in Mallorytown, who had introduced him to the Lower Salmon in 1968 or so, but Jack did not answer his phone; I'll try again later.

Time for another update. On Friday Bob Edwards called me back from Ottawa. Bob said Jake was not too keen on whitewater, only ever did it with him, and never on the Lower Salmon. However, he said his own introduction to whitewater was in 1963, on the Lower Salmon near Lonsdale, led by Jack Brown. I challenged him about the date and told him all our conflicting stories, but he remained quite certain he had been in Grade 12 at the time. Today I called Jack

Brown again, and Jack is quite certain Bob was already teaching at the time they first paddled the Lower Salmon, probably around 1973. As all of Jack's recollections completely agree with Ed's and yours, I think we should conclude that Bob misremembers the date of his trip with Jack.

On Saturday I phoned Ned Franks. Ned said his first whitewater was the Napanee in 1967. He liked it so much that he scouted the Lower Salmon by maps and by road, and paddled it with friends in the spring of 1968, not knowing if anybody else had ever done it. Considering that Bob thinks Jake never paddled the Lower Salmon River, I wonder if it might have been Ned's group you remember seeing there in 1968?

Also on Saturday, Dale Myrfield showed me a mimeographed binder dated 1970, published by the Voyageurs, a whitewater group based in Oshawa-Toronto. It has maps and descriptions for many Eastern Ontario rivers (including the Lower Madawaska, Upper Madawaska, Opeongo, Skootamatta, and Upper Black Rivers), but no mention of the Salmon River.

All things considered, it seems the Ferguson brothers in 1966 were the first to paddle the Lower Salmon River for fun, and that probably nobody tried the Upper Salmon River before 1970.

IS THIS ACTIVITY RIGHT FOR ME? Is it within my limits of fitness and skill? Do I have the right clothing, footwear and equipment? What water, food and protectants should be included in my pack? What are the potential risks, and do I accept them? Is there a health problem that could affect my participation? Am I aware of strategies to minimise impact on the environment?

Your leader can help with these and other questions when you call, and at the same time describe the plan for the activity. Also, at the designated meeting place you will be required to read an outline of the activity and the anticipated risks, before signing a waiver. Good preparation and safety awareness on the part of each participant will make the trip less risky and more enjoyable for all.

There is a \$5 fee for non-members on paddling trips and overnight trips. Guests are welcome at no charge on non-paddling day trips.

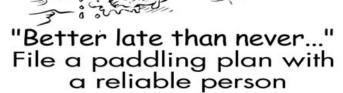

APR 1, Sun. LOWER **SALMON WHITE-**WATER PADDLE

PLUS. This outing is intended for paddlers already familiar with the Lower Salmon. After completing our usual 12km trip from Roblin to Kingsford, we shall decide whether to paddle another 7.5km downriver. The extra stretch

includes 3km of swifts and Class-1 rapids, a 30m portage around a weir in Lonsdale, and three short Class-2 rapids. We shall start earlier than



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usual, stop for lunch farther downriver than usual, and drive the shuttle in two stages so that any or all can end the trip at Kingsford if we wish (or if conditions dictate). Call Cathy Polk 546 1017.

APR 7, Sat. MASSASSAUGA CREEK PAD-DLE AND HIKE. A CCC rite of spring!
