## Barron Canyon Camping Trip August 2-4 by Steve Manders

About 15 people participated in the Barron Canyon trip in the east end of Algonquin P.P. this year. Beth Orr carefully organized it, but was not able to participate due to illness. Quite a few participants were guests of members and lacked paddling skills, but we managed anyway. We arrived in Pembroke about 10 a.m. then the Archray camp site where Tom Thomson's original 1916 log cabin still stands. We loaded the boat and paddled to Stratton Lake camp site, unloaded the boats and paddled to the water slides and High Falls. It is a fascinating and fun place, quite unique. There is a 4 m. drop on the slide, over a



10 m. distance into a deep pool of water, and other diving rocks. Finally, there was High Falls, about 7 m. high, and very scenic. From there we went back to the camp, only a km. or two away.

On August 3 we set out with 3 people per canoe and as little gear as possible for the long and very rough 5.5 km. of portaging around rapids and water falls. Once we reached the canyon, we had 100 m. high cliffs on each side of the river, and some parts over hung the water. The scene was spectacular. No one was fishing, but large bass were aggressively hungry for any food scraps thrown into the river.

On the final day, we packed camp and faced a number of brief but very strong squalls, otherwise the weather was perfect for paddling. On the way out of the park, we took a short hike to the top of the Barron Canyon, peered over the edge, and took lots of pictures. The portages were very rough but no one tripped, the bugs were not too bad, and the water was pleasant for swimming. Everyone brought far too much food, and no bears were seen.

# St.Lawrence River from Gananoque to Rockport, by Steve Manders

Steve Manders led a new club trip along the north shore of the St.Lawrence River from Gananoque to Rockport on August 10, one way, which required a car shuttle. This was the third part of a 3 day trip from Kingston to Rockport, done in stages. The various locations used along the river were chosen for washroom availability, and ease of launching the boats. The distance from Gananoque to Rockport was 21 km. but we had the wind and current helping us along which was part of the plan. There were 8 kayaks and 2 canoes along. Refreshments were enjoyed on the patio of one of the restaurants in Rockport at the end of the trip.

We had lunch and a swim just past Landon Bay, then a brief pit stop at the Ivy Lea Provincial Park. We enjoyed viewing the many multimillion dollar houses along the way, and many just as expensive boats. The weather was near perfect for such a trip. An added bonus was the Poker Run with the million dollar boats roaring up the river as we quietly paddled down stream. The tour boats and many private boats were all out in force to watch this event.

The big open waters make the weather and winds a serious issue to pay attention to. This is always done at the trip leader's discretion. Our first leg from our Boat House to Grass Creek was cancelled due to weather. The trip from Grass Creek to Gananoque went very well. There is a good boat launching ramp and picnic spot by the east Howe Island ferry, on the island. It served our lunch purposes well. We enjoyed watching a family of swans from there. The signets were less than a week old. We all learned a great deal about this magnificent body of water near us that we have over looked for so long.

Part of the objective of this new trip was to familiarize us with the boat launching facilities along the river, so that members could more easily make private trips. There is a large marine chart in the back of our boat house, it will help you plan your own trip there.

Your trip coordinator can help with these and other questions when you call, and describe the plan for the activity. Also, at the designated meeting place you will be required to read an outline of the activity and the anticipated risks, before signing a waiver. Good preparation and safety awareness on the part of each participant make a trip less risky and more enjoyable for all.

#### Saturday October 5 Rock Dunder Fundraisers on Take A Hike Day

Rock Dunder, the Rideau Waterway Land Trust property on Whitefish Lake is a great 4-season destination for Canoe Club activities. As a Land Trust property, it receives no direct government funding to help with operating costs. Since this property is open to the public, they are reaching out to the community to support and maintain the access road, parking, signage, and trails. In partnership with the Morton Community Hall, they are hosting two events on Take a Hike Day to raise funds and to build community awareness.

The morning event is a Walk-A-Thon where individuals or teams line up sponsors (or sponsor themselves) for a walk to the summit of Rock Dunder and back again. Distance is 5 km; moderate to difficult terrain and you are rewarded with a spectacular view. A hearty 8 a.m. breakfast at the Morton Community Hall sets off the event.

The afternoon events start off at noon with a soup and sandwich lunch at the Morton Hall

(cost \$10 per person), a slide-show of the area's natural heritage by biologist Simon Lunn, followed by a guided Fall walk on the Rock Dunder trails.

#### Saturday October 19: Sydenham Lake Paddle


