Club Updates

Exploring the Future of Trips

The CCC Board wishes to recognize the tireless efforts of our trip leaders. Without their dedication and willingness to give up their time to organize trips, we would not have a club.

Our club is expanding and now has roughly 150 members. And without them, we would also not have a club.

We would like to ensure that both trip leaders and participants have the best possible experiences on our paddling trips. In this context, we feel that there are opportunities for improvements which would benefit both. In addition there are certain legal and safety requirements which all guided trips (paddling

or not) must follow to ensure the safety of the participants.

There have been many great suggestions and ideas 'floated' around and discussed by the Board and various organizers and participants. These ideas need to be examined and thought through, and some concrete steps taken to make improvements.

Consequently we have struck a working group of experienced leaders and participants to sort through all the ideas and present an action plan to the board for approval. We hope to have the action items completed well in advance of the next paddling season.

September

Saturday, September 30: Eagle Lake Canoe / Kayak

A scenic paddle at a leisurely pace on fairly sheltered waters surrounded by typical Canadian Shield (granite shores and islands and large pine trees), with few cottages, and the start of some Fall colours. Lunch will be on a small island and if you are up for it take a swim. One destination will be Elephant Rock from which there is a stunning view. The put-in is a good public boat launch site with a sandy beach and ample parking. No shuttles or portages. The Seed to Sausage shop is ten minutes up Hwy 38 if you are interested! A 6 km paddle from Outlet at the southwest corner of Charleston Lake takes us to Huckleberry Hollow on the south shore of the lake. Weather permitting, we shall put in at Gray's Beach (beside the 1000-Islands Parkway 1.5km east of the Hwy-2 overpass) and paddle 8 km down the St. Lawrence to the upscale Ivy-Lea Restaurant and Coach-House, where we can view the creations of numerous talented artisans (including the woodworking wizardry of CCC paddler Kevin Juckers) and/or simply hang out for a while in beautiful

Note: Depending on wind conditions, substantial waves may be encountered on the river; a trip for experienced paddlers who are comfortable paddling in strong current, windy, and choppy water conditions.

A third & thrilling K2O

Paddling Race takes particpants from Cataraqui Canoe Club to Rideau Club in Ottawa



K20 racers rise with the dawn!

The Kingston to Ottawa 200 (K2O) Paddling Race, Ontario's longest non-stop paddling marathon, had seen it's 3rd annual return this year over the summer weekend of July 22nd-23rd. With the start line commencing at the Cataraqui Canoe Club and following the entire Rideau Canal waterway to finish at the Rideau Canoe Club, racers this year were tasked with competing amongst a record high number of 38 teams and 51 paddlers (with 16 teams challenging the 100km half distance) and completing the entire distance on water within a 36 hour time limit (24 hour limit for half distance teams).

Attracting both competitive and recreational paddlers alike from around the region, this past event included a variety of solo/tandem canoeists, kayakers and even stand up paddleboarders who took on the incredible challenge.


Year after year, the bar continues to be raised with this past race having seen its toughest competition yet with both new and personal records in each category. Early on the first quarter stretch had seen some close back and forth battles for first place but team number 10 (#wepaddle - Mike & Fiona Vincent from Regina, Saskatchewan) had pulled through shortly after, maintaining their first place position with a strong lead for the remainder of the race — along with setting a new incredible K2O record time of 21:08:39! Their record is sure to drive more challengers and competition in future years to come. Another very special shout out goes to team number 16 (Ivo Prudins with a very fitting team name "Pruvit") for being the very first stand up

paddleboarder to complete the 200km distance, finishing with a time of 33:06:25.

This year's inspiring group of competitors continued upholding the traditions of determination, grit, and smiles all the way
